About The handbook of multidisciplinary and integrated heart failure care



Every person living with heart failure has a unique journey. However, there are five key areas where care typically fails patients. These 'pressure points' are: presentation and diagnosis; discharge and early follow-up; clinical management; patient activation and self-care; and advance care planning.

The handbook demonstrates why multidisciplinary and integrated care are essential to providing optimal heart failure care. It describes the current 'state of play' in Europe in terms of performance and barriers, and a summary of each 'pressure point' outlining the issue, potential solutions and case studies.

We hope that this resource helps advocates to share a compelling and evidence-based policy case for change, win the support of key decision makers, and ensure more consistent implementation of best practice.

Heart failure in Europe: key messages

- The burden of heart failure is significant and growing:
 - Heart failure affects at least 15 million adults in Europe
 - 1 in 5 people can expect to live with heart failure at some point in their life
 - Heart failure is the no.1 cause of unplanned hospital admissions
 - We expect a 50% rise in hospital admissions in the next 25 years
 - Best-practice care can achieve a 30% reduction in hospitalisation



The European Society of Cardiology (ESC) 2016 guidelines for heart failure clearly state the need for multidisciplinary management programmes.

- The physical and psychological burden of living with heart failure can be considerable.
- Although the prognosis is poor, the right package of care makes a huge difference
- Care must focus on the needs of the individual patient at each stage of their condition.



What is multidisciplinary and integrated care?

Multidisciplinary and integrated heart failure care is about delivering the best care possible, focused on each individual's needs and preferences.



Multidisciplinary care is about ensuring the person with heart failure has access to the right specialists at the right points in their care journey.

Integrated care is about providing the tools and creating the environment for multidisciplinary teams to provide person-centred and coordinated care.



On 5 September 2018 the Heart Failure Policy Network launched *The handbook of multidisciplinary and integrated heart failure care.* Multidisciplinary and integrated models are about 'getting care right' for each individual patient – and present a huge opportunity for providing high-quality and sustainable heart failure management.

Despite the wealth of evidence that such care is beneficial to patients, healthcare professionals and the healthcare system as a whole, we are not seeing it as often as we should across Europe. Unfortunately, there are many barriers to optimal care and many initiatives are 'stuck in pilot mode'.

The handbook is a practical resource designed to help advocates drive much-needed multidisciplinary and integrated heart failure care. It highlights 10 key demands on European governments to improve existing care and ensure readiness for the future burden of heart failure. The report has been endorsed by 35 leading patient advocacy, scientific and professional organisations.

With 15 million people across Europe living with heart failure, and the incidence and prevalence of heart failure set to rise significantly in the coming years, we must pay greater attention to the way care is provided. Such approaches are the only viable way of planning for future heart failure patients, whilst providing high-quality and personalised care for those living with this chronic condition.
